Spiritual Emphasis Week

Spiritual Emphasis Week at Christian Central Academy is an annual opportunity to gather the middle and high school students to hear uplifting messages that would have an impact on their lives as believers inside and outside the context of a Christian school.

This year's Spiritual Emphasis Week was held from February 2–5 and headed by **Pastor Deone Drake**, as CCA Bible teacher, and his son Jonathan (2006 alumni). The theme of the week was *How to Waste Your Life*. During this four-day event, each day's message addressed a particular way that faculty and students alike could waste their lives; simply by involving themselves in a direction that God has not called His followers to pursue.

In Tuesday morning's Chapel time, Pastor Deone focused on the theme for the week and spoke to students on how to Wasting your life by being a fool—making decisions now, that will negatively impact their future. It was a challenge to consider the choices they would be making. On Wednesday morning, **Pastor Jonathan Drake** spoke on Wasting your life by living like a Pharisee. He talked about the danger of making the outside look good so that one can get away with rebellion on the inside. He then used Thursday's Chapel to talk about the danger of Wasting your life by living as if your body was your own—challenging students to consider the choices they are making now and will be making regarding sexual purity. On the final day, Pastor Deone closed the week's messages by focusing on Wasting you life by living as if you don't need Christ as your Savior.

"I liked the way Pastor Jonathan gave us real-life examples reminding us that we are all sinners and there is no one whose sin is bigger than someone else's," said Sophomore's Spiritual Advisor, **Tahelah Noel.** Junior Spiritual Advisor **Abigail Stone** remembered that Pastor Deone "told us that we shouldn't treat God as a life insurance policy; we need to focus on Him always, no matter what we're doing." "Life-change is always the goal and we are confident that God met the students where they were and moved them closer in their walk with Christ," said Pastor Deone.

Almost three years ago this spring, CCA was in the throes of planning for the first accreditation visit by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools. The Common Core Standards Initiative has presented a very demanding and complex educational landscape, with its continuous revision of the implementation, the unrelenting accountability pressures, and the revelation of an ever-increasing number of diverse learners. CCA is cautiously tackling "The Core" in a limited way, still aiming to assess student performance in a meaningful way. It is impossible to measure student growth, if there are no clear targets for what students are expected to know and be able to do. At CCA, we believe that academic excellence does not have to be sacrificed in favor of spiritual development. Rather, we strive, in whatever we do, to "do it all for the glory of God" (1 Corinthians 10:31). The goal of our accreditation is to bring greater academic rigor.

The accreditation protocol "Excellence by Design" transcends the status quo and follows a continuous

improvement plan. We will not allow the Common Core to derail the accreditation. We are making progress; teachers have begun to see value in The Core, while a more certain outcome remains to be seen. The accreditation protocol consists of five commitments which CCA continues to endorse, as follows: a focus on student performance and growth in four specific academic areas; a culture of accountability in student performance; a planning ethic; commitment to continuous improvement and involvement of representative constituents. The midterm performance report will show a need for improvement in some areas as well as significant strengths in others. We are extremely encouraged. A full accreditation review will take place in 2016.

The success of CCA is still its excellent faculty and staff and an especially "hands-on" Board of Directors. CCA aims to achieve excellent fiscal health with the objective of hiring and retaining the best and most effective teachers. The Board, under the able leadership of **President Eric Alcott**, is diligent in its efforts to secure a strong future for CCA.

CCA thanks everyone who continues to support and believe in our school. It is my personal joy to serve this wonderful community, trusting in God for wisdom and courage for the future—even as we maintain the mission.


