"Fusing Truth with Technology"

n 1450, Johannes Guttenberg, with the world's first moveable type, launched the world's first information revolution. Interestingly, the Bible was his first printed book. Soon thereafter, an obscure monk, Martin Luther, employing the new technology, disseminated numerous tracts. Among them were his famous 95 theses, nailed to the Wittenberg Cathedral doors, which challenged a corrupt church and launched a reformation. Through such men and nascent technology, God's word was wrested from the grip of cloistered elites and made available to all men.

Technology matters. And as Christians we should not fear it, but embrace it. Today, with the exponential explosion of computer technology, we are in the throes of another information revolution that again is transforming not only our economy, but very lives.

In the past, traditional literacy of reading and writing was enough to participate in Guttenberg's first information revolution. Today, standing on the threshold of our current computer information revolution, a "new literacy," beyond merely reading and writing, will be required of our children. That is computer literacy. Such literacy will go beyond pedestrian tasks such as word processing, spread sheets, and power point presentations to higher order skills such as programing, code writing, and design. Senior James Yang and I went on a trip to China this past Spring. Our top goal was to recruit more international students for CCA. I also want to share something extraordinarily improbable that happened on this trip.

James is from Xichang. In preparation for this trip, he expressed to me a desire to visit his middle school of over three thousand students. From a recruiting perspective, it was a no-brainer to add Xichang to our agenda. James attended there from 2010-2013. He later decided to follow Jesus during his time here in the states.

From 2008-2010, I lived in a city south of Xichang called Kunming. During that time, I became friends with a woman from Canada named "Lily". I knew that she was an English teacher in China, but I did not know where

Before traveling to Xichang, we stopped to visit my friend in Chengdu, which is north of Xichang. He told us that Lily lived in Xichang and gave us her number. Shortly after, James and I told a different friend of mine over the phone that we were going to Xichang next. He replied. "Are you going to see Lily?"

Though nothing clicked for James and I the first time we heard Lily's name, something did the second time. James said, "My middle school teacher's name is Lily." Immediately I asked him to show me a picture. He looked up the middle school's website and sure enough it was the same Lily!

It was not long before we were in Xichang eating lunch with her. Discussing the "chances" of the three of us being connected, she said, "With God this is probable." She also said to James, "How does it feel to be the answer to my prayer? I pray that all of my students will one day become Christians."

How does it feel to be connected to a school and a community that is instrumental in reaching international students like James with the Gospel? How does it feel to be connected to a school and a community that God has used to answer the prayer of a woman from the other side of the world in China? 




