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Twenty Three Graduates Begin a New Journey

CCA students may have questioned: Why Christian education? Why CCA? Noted educator and special guest, **Dr. Martha E. MacCallough**, stated that *Christian Education* or any private education is a unique journey in today's America. It is a path less traveled. Only a small percentage of children have the privilege of attending a private school.

Since the quality of education in this country has been falling behind other nations, many studies have examined the reason and are seeking to improve the educational system in America. Social science research noted that secular schools promote an open and tolerant philosophy to accept anything and everything. This kind of teaching has led many to believe in "nothing," ending up with no

Dr. JOHN ROSEMOND, Child Psychologist, Visits CCA

CCA was privileged to meet and hear child psychologist, speaker, author and syndicated columnist who drew a large gathering on Tuesday, May 20, 2014. **Dr. John Rosemond** held a *Meet & Greet* book signing in the school library before the presentation.

Dr. Rosemond's lecture theme was "Parenting with love and leadership." He stated that today's parents are more focused on building friendships with their children and seeking their approval rather than exercising their role as parents. He stated that leadership has to precede relationships.

Mr. Rosemond gave this advice: Parents find many ways to enable their children: for example, assisting their children with their homework. They want their kids to get good grades, so they step in to help. As parents, we should be letting them do their own work to help prepare for citizenship. This will teach them to be willing to help others instead of just themselves. Another downfall to parenting is using awards and punishments to manipulate behavior. He feels there is no evidence that this works with human beings, but with pets. He suggests using creative approaches to get the job done. Motivate child compliance. It's not about psychology, it's simply about loving your children and providing leadership to them."

Mr. Rosemond will return for another meeting with parents on March 3, 2015.

Mrs. Lawrence Announces Retirement!

Mrs. Nurline Lawrence has informed the board of her intention to retire her position as Head of School after a 16-year tenure. A meeting was held at CCA by Mr. Eric Alcott and the Board of Directors on Tuesday, June 24 regarding plans for this leadership change.

Mr. Alcott began by praising the outstanding work that Mrs. Lawrence has done in improving the overall stature of Christian Central Academy. He stressed the importance of a seamless transition; therefore, the Board of Directors has decided to engage a reputable national agency to help find a qualified replacement

Representatives from Christian School Executive Search (CSES), **Mr. Larry Kooi** and **Mr. Barry Koops**, have been selected to lead the search in finding cadidates for the new leadership. Mr. Koops was not able to attend this meeting. This recruitment procedure will take several months, as a new head is selected from a large pool of available candidates. Much of the recruitment will be via social networking. CCA's committee will be comprised of six to eight people, some of whom will be Board members, involved especially during the interviewing and negotiating period as they work with CSES.

Toward the end of the meeting Mr. Alcott took questions and comments from the attendees.

Senior Baccalaureate Service Held June 8

core set of beliefs. People are unable to respect those with whom they disagree. Tolerance is lost.

Political scientists have also tried to come up with a system that would be best for human development and flourish in preparing students for life. And, Brookings Institute (the D.C. "think tank") did independent research on advancing education in our American democracy; one of their findings showed that private schools were outperforming public schools.

Many books have also been written on the subject, suggesting that what's needed is a coherent curriculum that encompasses a sense of purpose and connectedness to life issues, one which would require a strategic design with goals. Educators agree that there is a need to broaden students' understanding of themselves and the world. Schools need to teach concepts, ideas and goals that will express values. They need a distinctive, well-defined mission. Christian education does that.

CCA graduates can celebrate the different path their parents chose and sacrificed for them. They will be open-minded because they know what they stand for—*Biblical truths*! They will go into the world knowing what they believe (possess critical thinking). They will understand and accept those with whom they disagree.

As CCA seniors look back to their foundation, and now begin their new forward journey, Dr. MacCallough gave them advice: Follow the written guide—*God's Word!* God prepared a plan for each life in advance, just as He did for Joshua who trusted God marching into the "promised land." Dr. MacCallough admonished all to be strong and courageous—to focus on the course—not turn to the left or the right—not depart from what they know—just stay on the path for Christ!
