

### FROM THE DESK OF THE HEAD OF SCHOOL

#### THE RIGHT STUFF

"Education without character is a dangerous thing. For character, not intellectual agility, is the source of right living."

ow many of us know someone whose life took an unfulfilled path towards mediocrity and disappointment? The refrain is always the same, "Pity, he had so much potential." "Pity, she had so much talent." Perhaps the saddest loss for a family is the unrealized potential of some of its members. The cruel irony is that the degree of talent and intellectual acumen, or potential an individual possess is NOT the main determinant to a person's success. Character is.

Our talents and abilities mean nothing without the determination borne of our character to realize our potential. It is character that gets us up in the morning to face the day, drives us to overcome obstacles and persevere. Even more, Character, provides a moral compass. In our hearts we all know this to be true.

Though the commonly perceived mission of school is to impart knowledge in classrooms, schools, like parents, for better or worse, play a major role in character formation. But what is the ultimate source of character? As Christians we know the answer and my grandfather said it best.

"Character itself has a source. It springs not from moral maxims, rules of conduct, proverbs, or thou-shalt-nots. Its derivation is higher. It grows out of religious experience—the effective religious experience that is the result of the Gospel of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ."<sup>2</sup>

This is the defining difference that sets CCA apart. At CCA we believe that "All truth is God's Truth" as we seek to integrate our Christian faith and learning in the holistic education of young people. This is a point worth elaboration. As stated earlier, all schools are *de facto* partners with parents in the character development of your child. The real question every parent should thoughtfully consider is: Precisely who and how effective is your partner (school) in the education/character development of your child while you are busy making a living and paying the bills?

For any parent, Christian or not, this is worth closer examination and borne out by some truly jaw dropping statistics. According the *U.S. News and World Report*, nearly forty percent of all entering college and university freshman across America will never see a graduation day. Thirty percent of entering freshmen will drop out their first year, never to return as sophomores.<sup>3</sup> Rising costs are often thought of as the main reason. However a plethora of research reveals that there is far more to this disturbing trend than mere money. Interestingly, character failings and the inability to adjust socially as well as academic unpreparedness are cited as major emerging culprits contributing to this astonishingly high dropout rate.

The New York Times pushes this point even further in a recent article stating, "Many students are arriving in college without the needed preparation...the pattern suggests that the main obstacle keeping Americans from a college education emerges long before they reach college." In other words, what is done in the education and rearing of young people before college matters more to their survival and success in college than financial issues.

Money aside, the bottom line is an alarming percentage of our youth cannot handle the rigors and challenges of independence beyond the loving nest of their parent's home. The surviving sixty percent struggle as well, taking on average six years to complete most standard four year college curriculums. Every concerned parent harbors the deep-seated fear wondering if his or her child is part of that stunning dropout rate.

Further questions loom in the minds of parents: What can they do to ensure their children's success before they leave the sheltered nest? What school "partner" best shares your Weltbild (World view)? How can their children best be prepared academically, socially, and spiritually to meet the impinging realities of succeeding in a competitive world of college admissions and professional world?

These are serious questions because what is at stake is not only a lot of money, but the ultimate welfare of what we hold dearest, our children. At CCA we know that the best education goes beyond our rigorous college prep academics, encompassing character development rooted in our belief in Jesus Christ. Our Christian *Weltbild* guides our integration of faith and learning. We believe in pursuing excellence in all we do because Christ is the model of excellence and our faculty seeks to emulate that, in and out of the classroom. At CCA we love and cherish our students from Kindergarten through 12th grade because Christ's greatest command was to love one another. No one "falls through the crack." Those are our fundamental beliefs and basic philosophy of not merely education, but *Christian* education. We believe that that is the right stuff.


## NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY NEW MEMBERS INDUCTED

## BACCALAUREATE SERVICE

ow many times have you had to answer the question, "What do you want to be when you grow up?" asked **Rev. Dr. James Widmer** to the Class of 2015. "Do you answer with identity or only with a job? There's a big difference... it goes to the very heart of your life and especially to your life with God."

At CCA's 17th **Baccalaureate Service**, held on Sunday, June 14, Rev. Windmer invited the soon-to-be graduates to take a few moments to think about not just what they want to DO, but about WHO they want to BE. When it comes to human identity we find it in Genesis 1:27, "So God created mankind in his own image, in the image of God he created them; male and famale he created them. "All of us are created in God's image as a result of His love and grace. We owe our very existence, image, and identity to God and no one else.

"Your identity is a gift from God, not a wage," Rev. Windmer continued. "As you move into this next part of your life journey, abide in Jesus so that you may live in your true identity no matter where you go or what you do."

Rev. Dr. James Widmer is pastor of the Kenmore Baptist Church in Kenmore, NY. He holds a BA from Amherst College, a Master of Divinity from Gordon Conwell Theological Seminary and a Doctor of Ministry from Ashland Theological Seminary. He has pastored several churches, written educational material, is a published author and accomplished presenter at workshops and seminars, often the keynote speaker.




