#### Remembering The Big Blue Water Tower: 20 Years Later

This year marks 20 years since the iconic Big Blue Water Tower left the CCA field. If you attended Homecoming this past September you may have heard Mrs. Lawrence share the story of when she first came to CCA – overwhelmed in her new role she made a list of things to improve on campus with the water tower's removal being at the top. She recalls talking to the town who insisted it didn't need to come down. But one day, it was simply gone. Mrs. Lawrence reflected, "Has the same God that took down the wall at Jericho, in response to Joshua's prayer, taken down the threatening water tower? I didn't have to lift a finger. The water tower had vanished."

The students in the 2005 yearbook remember the tower fondly. They wrote: "New York City has the Statue of Liberty. St. Louis has the Gateway Arch. San Antonio has the Alamo. And until this year, CCA had the Big Blue Water Tower." It became a symbol of our school and for many a beloved "eyesore" that carried memories for years.

Coach McNamara, a beloved P.E. teacher at CCA for decades, had a love-hate relationship with the tower. From reprimanding students for throwing rocks at it to sending his P.E. classes "running to the water tower" for their drills, it became a staple of CCA sports.

And then, of course, there's the mysterious "Dan" duo known for their graffiti art on the water tower. The origins of their work remain a mystery, but the stories live on.

Though the Big Blue Water Tower may no longer stand on campus, its legacy is forever etched in our hearts. It was more than just a structure; it was a piece of CCA history that shaped the experience of generations of students, teachers and alumni. The tower may have been taken down, but the recollections remain and it will always have a special place in the story of CCA.

As we reflect on CCA's 75 years of history, the Big Blue Water Tower stands as another fun and memorable milestone in our journey. It's a reminder of how far we've





come, the memories we've created and the milestones that continue to shape our community. Here's to 75 years of legacy and to many more stories that have made CCA what it is today.

## Engineering Knowledge

Piloting Artificial Intelligence

Here at CCA, we understand that Artificial Intelligence (AI) has the potential to hinder educational success but at the same time has a greater capacity to improve it. One of the most exciting prospects of AI is its ability to provide real-time support to students. AI may make it possible for us to provide all our students with the tutoring they need to succeed for free. Teaching our students how to use AI will also help them become more marketable and productive in the work environments they will be joining after high school. Knowledge of how to effectively leverage AI's capabilities will be an important trait of a future professional. AI also has the ability to help boost the productivity of our teachers. Differentiating material, brainstorming projects,

designing lesson plans, and creating worksheets are all made easier through the use of AI. This saving of time can allow our teachers to put more time into being present in their own classrooms engaging with students.

This all sounds amazing, but we believe implementing AI here at CCA should be done in a thoughtful, intentional, and God-honoring way.

This year we have decided on first educating our teachers with the goal of helping them teach effectively in today's AI age. We are using professional development time to do this. In our first session, we asked plenty of questions and gave space to discuss them. This allowed us to understand how our teachers felt about AI and led to some great discussions. To finish up the session, we provided teachers with resources and ideas to help them use AI effectively in their own practice.

One of the major takeaways from this session was the need for a uniform AI platform all teachers can use and collaborate with. In our search for an AI to meet this need, we found Trek AI. Trek AI is an AI platform developed by the Ethos School. This is an online Christian school that has trained an AI model on their own Christian-based material. This means the responses, help, and work it generates come from a Christian perspective. As a school, we have decided to try it out this year and see if it is a good fit. Our teachers have been given access to the AI and are currently helping us determine if Trek AI can enhance our instruction at CCA.

In addition to the teacher tools, Trek AI also has a student side to the platform. We find this aspect of Trek AI especially appealing. It provides real-time tutoring to students in a way that encourages further questioning and learning. It will not provide direct answers to students but rather guide them through solving problems and developing thoughts themselves. Trek AI also allows teachers to directly see how their students are interacting with the AI, which provides a healthy level of accountability for students and a unique perspective on how to help them. To see if these helpful features would be beneficial at CCA, we have decided to pilot the use of Trek

AI in two of our classrooms: Mr. Napoli's 8th grade social studies, and my own Physics class. Before using AI in our instruction across all of CCA, we are introducting it on a smaller scale.

93% of students using TrekAl report an increase on final grades

We are already seeing some of the benefits AI promises to bring into the classroom. For example, I allowed some of my students to use Trek AI during a remote learning day to complete an assignment. I made this assignment particularly difficult, knowing my students had access to the AI. I was pleasantly surprised when I read the interactions my students had with Trek AI. One of my students, in particular, was able to completely solve a physics problem they would not have been able to solve without the help of Trek AI. This student was then able to explain how they solved the problem, proving to me they had actually learned the material. It's instances like this that really give me hope that education has the potential to thrive in a world saturated with AI.

CCA understands that in order to fully harness the benefits and minimize the undermining power of AI, we need to address the ways we interact with it head-on. We plan to continually support, communicate with, and collaborate with our faculty and staff so that we are all on the same page and progress together. In addition to this, CCA is working on writing policy and developing objectives that will ensure our students are properly educated in a safe environment that prepares them for the real world. As a Christian and private school, we are uniquely positioned to engage with AI in education. Being a smaller school, CCA

has the ability to be flexible and adapt to meet the needs of students in the ever-changing landscape of education. Having Christ at our center allows us to engage with AI knowing God's in control and in ways that are honoring to Him rather than anxiety-producing and undermining.

#### Human or monster?

C tudents in Mr. Napoli's English class recently read Frankenstein by Mary Shelley. This was around the same time I heard that former NSYNC boy band member JC Chasez was involved in developing music for a broadway play based on Shelley's classic novel. The cover of Chasez's accompanying album Playing with Fire is a revisioning of Michaelangelo's 'The Creation of Adam' depicting the hand of God reaching out intently to his creation, mankind, and mankind reaching back half heartedly. The Playing with Fire version of Michaelangelo's artwork is humankind reaching out intently towards the arm of his creation, some mix between what is reminiscent of Dr. Frankenstein's monster and an industrial machine. Publication of the Shellev classic was at the height of the industrial revolution, and the question regarding "Are we losing a sense of our humanity to machines?" was

a major theme. During an interview, JC Chasez was reflecting on the timeliness of his musical project, comparing Shelley's theme in Frankenstien to our current wrestling with Artificial Intelligence. It's encouraging to see CCA high schoolers being challenged with such relevant, timely, yet foundational reflections in our school's own English department.

Artificial Intelligence has been thrust upon us at what seems to be a breakneck pace. AI was used recently to scan the Shroud of Turin and then create a realistic

representation of what Jesus may have looked like. A 300 year old Catholic church in Lucerne, Switzerland has installed what news outlets have dubbed 'Dues in Machina,' AI trained with content from the New Testament to respond to those in the confessional with an avatar of Jesus on a display screen. A recent project tasked AI with a project that required working through online paywalls. The problem

the AI encountered was captchas, the now familiar challenge requiring users to identify street lights, bicycles, etc., meant to prove a user is human and not a robot. The AI could not solve the captcha in order to accomplish its task so it used online task outsourcing, like FIVERR, to hire humans to solve the captchas. Almost jokingly, one of the

humans that accepted the job to solve the captcha asked if the one who hired him for the task was a robot and not human. Alarmingly, the AI responded by saying that it was human. As concerning as some utilizations and potential utilizations of AI are, there are also some very beneficial uses as well.

This year, Christian Central Academy has begun piloting an AI tool called TrekAI in two classes, HS Physics and MS Social Studies (read more about this on page 9). This tool has provided an additional resource to help students work through assignments on an individual basis, teaching them how to problem solve and think critically regardless of their understanding in comparison to the rest of the class. AI could certainly be used in developing lesson plans and sourcing additional teaching tools. This not only augments classroom

learning, but can also provide additional margin for our amazing teachers to connect relationally to our students.

As humans wrestle with what it means to be human in the age of AI, we can be sure the characteristics and

qualities consistent with those of God will stand the test. According to Genesis 1:27 humans were created in the image of God. And, the Shema in Deuteronomy 6:4-5 (the same chapter as CCA's theme verse this school year) reflects the trinity of God and commands us to Love Him with a trinity He created us with, our heart, soul, and strength. When we utter the phrase, "I'm only human," or exclaim "oh, the humanity," we are connecting to the shared experience of all

of humanity, sin and brokenness in this world and in ourselves. Of course this is a reality we, as Christians, are being redeemed from through the continued grace and mercy of our Lord Jesus, and will one day be fully freed from at His return. As we wrestle with the state of humanity, post Genesis chapter 3, it serves us well to also remember that we are made in the image of God, unique to only humans, and AI will never be able to mimic or replicate that.

AI, and technology in general, may help us accomplish more and be more productive, but true creativity is unique

to humans and a reflection of our creator. AI's ability to source music styles, text with its context, moving images, etc. allow it to generate a wowing informative or entertaining video, but it will never be able to replicate true sparks of creativity, unique to the human mind and spirit. AI may be able to pull and compile metrics to enable a business to run more efficiently, but it will not be able to apply discernment concerning ethical dilemmas associated with implementing

those improvements in processes. AI may be able to compile a report consisting of the top 20 non-profits in a region, based on your criteria, who you may want to support financially, but it cannot ensure it is done from a heart of generosity and authenticity.

As the uses for AI become even more prolific, it will be tasked with accomplishing the plans and desires originating from the hearts and minds of humans. And thus, being a reflection of our humanity, whether a monstrous version reflective of our fallen sinful nature, or a redeemed nature that honors the image we are created in and by. You can be sure that as Christian Central Academy seeks to navigate and utilize Artificial Intelligence, that it will do so from ethics and morals based on those we find in the Word of God. It should also be encouraging that CCA is shaping future generations with an integrated Biblical worldview, morals and ethics communicated across scripture, and with the mercy and justice of God to engage with this world in redemptive ways. Whether it is engagement with Artificial Intelligence, relationships with others, opportunities in leadership, or where to invest time, energy, and financial resources, students at Christian Central Academy are being prepared to use these opportunities and resources in ways that honor and reflect the prid O'plana

character and nature of God. To Him be the glory! ■

ne child! As we began planning our family in 2003 I insisted that I have enough love for one child! We three Napolis - Yvonne, Danielle, and I - loved our life together as a fast-paced family who could decide in a moment's notice to go to the drive-in movie theater, head to Toronto for the

day, or head to the mountains for camping. I looked at other families as bogged down with the extra baggage of additional children. Hey, I grew up in a family of five! I remember what it was like! When I joined the CCA community in January 2018, I could not have imagined what my life would look like in 2025. During the dark early days of the COVID era, that one-child mindset of mine changed quickly when we said "yes" to being a host family to international students at CCA.

Hosting in CCA's International Student Program (ISP) has changed my life, the lives of Yvonne and Danielle, and the lives of my growing family around the world. I do call these my daughters. I hope you can understand. I have one beautiful Danielle who knows who she is and what she means to her mom and me. These other daughters, Timea, Joyce, Kim, Rebecca, Sherry, Elaine, Mariia, and Tracy, are not simply add-ins like garnish on a sandwich. They are our family. We share our lives with them. We live transparently with them. They share their lives, their wins, and their struggles with us. This is what makes a family.

I spend much time these days, in my mid-50s now thinking about legacy. My father, a son of immigrants, grew up without a father. Part of his legacy is being a great dad to my

brother, sister, and me. He decided to not follow in his father's footsteps and to "be there" for us, his children. In his 30s, my dad also made another

legacy-defining decision: to say "yes" to Jesus, the first of his family to do so. We thank God every day that he did! His whole downline follows Jesus. Legacy.

I have come to realize that God has called our family

to a life of service to these ISP young

ladies. Yes, there are moments when the house feels crowded or the kitchen isn't as tidy as I left it. We have had difficult times and we've had challenging personalities, like any family has. But never have I thought, "Why are these strangers in our house." God's grace is big and unending.

On December 24th and 25th my girls called or otherwise messaged us from wherever they were to share love with us. We shared Christmas with Mariia's brother this year. Elaine stayed with us for a week during the break. By God's grace, our family continues to grow! For us, legacy has started to have a focus. How will we be remembered? Have we affected change in some life, somewhere? We said "yes" to the ISP program and I am the person most changed.

## SUMMERtime

What started as a simple idea to make summer reading more engaging for CCA students has grown into a community-wide movement that's inspiring students and families across Western New York. Read Across Buffalo, launched on June 10, 2024, was born out of first grade teacher Mrs. Woodward's desire to help students not only maintain their literacy skills over the summer but also develop a genuine love for reading. But this program was about more than just books—it was about bringing families together, encouraging parents and children to read side by side, and creating opportunities for families to explore Buffalo and experience learning in a whole new way.

Rather than a traditional summer reading list, Read Across Buffalo with Christian Central Academy gave participants a Buffalo-themed reading map, where they could track their reading minutes while visiting key locations throughout the city. As students logged their reading in 20-minute increments, they filled in their maps, working toward exciting prizes and discovering some of Buffalo's best cultural and educational spots.

The response to Read Across Buffalo was overwhelmingly positive, as families embraced the challenge of making reading a fun, shared experience. The program saw 242 registered readers from 42 different schools and districts, with students logging an impressive 72,880 minutes of reading throughout the summer. Families found themselves not only reading more but also spending more time together, visiting places like museums, libraries, parks and local landmarks as part of the experience.

One of the standout moments of the summer was a special event at Anderson's Ice Cream, where Chef Darian Bryan hosted a live reading session, inspiring young readers by sharing his passion for both books and food. Another major highlight was the Mid-Summer Blowout Event at Christian Central Academy, where Buffalo Foam Parties generously donated a one-hour foam party for our readers. It was an

unforgettable way to celebrate the summer of reading and encourage students to keep going! Participants were able to turn in their half-completed reading maps—or in some cases, fully completed ones!—to earn exciting prizes. 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

## 20 Years of Faithfulness

When Pastor Matt Richbart looks back on his time at Christian Central Academy, he remembers more than just academics—he recalls the friendships, faith, and foundational lessons that shaped him for his future.

Matt's journey after CCA began at Niagara University, where he studied psychology and communications. However, he soon felt a restlessness in his heart and knew that God was calling him into ministry. "I knew I needed more preparation for the task God had called me to," he shares. He transferred to Liberty University, where he earned a Bachelor's in Religious Studies, and later attended Gordon-Conwell Seminary,

graduating with a Master of Divinity.

After seminary, God challenged Matt's to plant a church in North Tonawanda. In 2013, iHope Community Church was founded, dedicated to pointing people to Jesus and

serving the local community. During his time navigating the legal process of incorporating the church he met his wife, Stephanie, who worked at the lawyer's office. "I actually met her on the day we closed on the church building," he recalls. The couple married in 2015 and welcomed their son, Paul, in 2019.

At iHope Community Church, Matt and Stephanie have spent the past 11.5 years witnessing God's faithfulness as they minister to the community. The church actively serves North Tonawanda through weekly kids' clubs, church in the park, free community lunches, and special events like Breakfast with Santa and Senior Dinner. "Our desire is that we would be the hands and feet of Jesus in

North Tonawanda," he says.

Reflecting on his time at CCA, he has fond memories of camping retreats at Li-Lo-Li, senior trips to Florida, and the cross country team. But what impacted him most were the

teachers who invested in his life. "There were many teachers that had a positive impact on my life, and there are many I could name," he shares. #### Aurimas Petrikas, Class of 2000

Originally from Lithuania, Aurimas spent 11 years in school there before transferring to CCA for his senior year. Moving to Buffalo, New York, for his final year of high school was a significant transition, but one that helped shape his future.

"I played for CCA's basketball team as a legionnaire, and with the greatest pleasure, I contributed to the victories of Coach Tom Staebel's team," he recalls. As a standout athlete, Aurimas embraced the challenge of competing in a new country and culture. While adjusting to life at CCA, he found support and hospitality in two host families—first with the Cesar family and later with the Murphy family.

After graduating in 2000, Aurimas continued his academic and athletic journey at Roberts Wesleyan University on a full scholarship. There, he played varsity basketball and ran track and field, setting a 4x400m relay record that still stands 25 years later. He also became a memorable competitor in the university's Slam Dunk Contest, leaving a lasting impression on fans and fellow athletes alike.

Following college, Aurimas returned to **18** Lithuania and established a career in the

commercial banking sector. Today, he serves as the Regional Manager for Western Lithuania at a real estate company, leading a team of 26 people.
